
## Miami Lighthouse is proud to announce that we have earned our eighth consecutive 4-star rating

reaching effect of this innovative education program is our client, Clinton C."



Forty-two teenage "transitioners" are currently enrolled in our HSHT Program which helps ready them for work after graduation. Funded by the Able Trust, our HSHT Program helps our students obtain internships, "shadow" professionals and experience many different jobs. They also learn important interviewing skills and how to write a good resume.
