It's back to school at Miami Lighthouse Academy, where children with visual impairments come together to learn and thrive in an inclusive environment. We are proud of the addition of third grade classes in partnership with Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS). The third-grade expansion aims to equip visually impaired students

with the skills, confidence, and accessible learning environment needed to succeed. Miami Lighthouse Academy is fully accredited and offers an inclusion environment for early learners (ages 1-4), and an early elementary with kindergarten, first grade, second grade and third grade for blind and visually impaired students. As a certified Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (VPK) provider, the Miami Lighthouse Academy enrolls students with and without vision impairment promoting an inclusive program and resulting in a sense of belonging for all children and families. We began offering third grade on August 16, 2025, in partnership with the M-DCPS Office of Educational Services and Exceptional Student Education. Third grade is a pivotal year in a child's academic journey particularly for blind and visually impaired children because students begin taking standardized tests in the fourth grade. Parent and teacher feedback demonstrates that visually impaired students need to be taught how to access and successfully complete

### Chairman's Letter

Friends of Miami Lighthouse,

Please take a few minutes to read our semi-annual newsletter, the *Lantern*, which highlights our continuing achievements and the impact of our four strategic initiatives.

- 1. In order to ensure that Miami Lighthouse has the financial capacity to sustainably meet the increasing demand for service, as part of our 95th Anniversary celebrated last January our 95th Anniversary Campaign was launched to raise \$9.5 million, for which funds raised are invested to sustain and grow our programs for another 95 years. We announced that four very generous donors committed to matching \$4.75 million, of which nearly \$1.75 million has been committed and matched. We now need to raise the remaining \$3 million. We are pleased to announce that our Board External Relations Committee voted to have a gala in January of 2028 when we can celebrate the completion of our \$9.5 million campaign to sustainably meet the increasing demand for services.
- 2. The first year of our Cortical/Cerebral Visual Impairment (CVI) Collaborative \$2 million interdisciplinary study concluded this September, the first year of the grant, with one journal article accepted and another pending.
- 3. Specialized learning for third graders with vision impairment is underway in partnership with Miami-Dade County Public Schools. Our goal is to prepare visually impaired students for standardized testing when they attend fourth grade at their community school.
- 4. We are pleased to announce that our Blind Soccer Program was selected for the 2025 Innovator of the Year Award by the Florida Association for Education and Rehabilitation of the Blind and Visually Impaired in recognition of our commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of individuals who are blind or visually impaired in Florida. Students from age one to eighteen have been learning blind soccer on our new blind soccer mini pitch. All soccer participants wear blindfolds to level the playing field, so everyone has to rely on ear/foot coordination. Miami Lighthouse has United States Association of Blind Athletes (USABA) credentialed soccer coaches. Because of our soccer initiative, the Miami-Dade County Public School System also has PE, as well as football and soccer coaches working on their USABA credentials, so the sport of blind soccer can be enjoyed by an even broader group of students with and without a vision disability, both those attending our Miami Lighthouse programs and in community schools.

Over the past 95 years we have grown and are now serving more than 28,000 program participants annually. I am proud to serve as board chair of this amazing institution and am grateful for your ongoing support. More than ever, we need your contributions as government funding has been scaled back both for our Heiken Children's Vision Program and for seniors. Our special thanks to all those who have given time and financial contributions in furtherance of our mission.

## President and CEO's Mid-Year Report

This report highlights some of the achievements made possible by contracts, grants, and most importantly the generosity of our donors. With your help, in fiscal year 2024 we served more than 28,000 program participants.

## **Blind Babies Early Intervention**

Our Blind Babies Program offers early intervention and parent education through a home visitation program for blind or visually impaired children from birth to age 5. These in-home visits support families, empower parents, and enhance blind children's readiness to learn. During the most recent 12-month period our Children's Specialists have provided in-home early intervention weekly services to 133 blind babies, increasing from 119 served in 2024.

## Senior Group Health and Activities Program (SGA)

Our SGA Program is the only program in Miami-Dade County providing vision rehabilitation services aimed at enhancing quality of life and independence for older adults (55+) who are legally blind. During calendar year 2024, there were 167 participants in our SGA and adult education programs. Visually impaired seniors typically attend our SGA program on Tuesday and Thursday or Monday, Wednesday and Friday. We express our gratitude to the Department of Education's Division of Blind Services and Miami-Dade County for helping support this program along with the M-DCPS Schoolboard through Lindsay Hopkins Technical College for continuing our GED and ESOL classes held at Miami Lighthouse for these visually impaired seniors.

## Florida Heiken Children's Vision Program

Our Florida Heiken Children's Vision Program prevents blindness by providing comprehensive eye health, vision exams and prescription eyeglasses at no cost to financially disadvantaged students statewide in grades Pre-K through 12. Last calendar year our Heiken Program provided 19,161 comprehensive eye exams and prescription eyeglasses if required.

### **PROGRAMS**

## September was Cortical Visual Impairment Month

Our exclusive CVI expert virtual international panel, "Advancing CVI Awareness and Innovation," convened on September 30th hosted by Miami Lighthouse for the Blind and Visually Impaired and supported by a 2025 Delta Gamma Foundation Service for Sight Grant. This engaging session brought together Dr. John Ravenscroft, Chair of Childhood Visual Impairment at the University of Edinburgh, and Miami Lighthouse's CVI Collaborative experts to provide education and research insights to support children with CVI addressing genetic and environmental risk factors, effective learning strategies, and the latest diagnostic tools for early detection and intervention in infants and young children leveraging the brain's neuroplasticity. It was moderated by Dr. Francois Sainfort, Chair and Professor, Department of Management and Entrepreneurship, H. Wayne Huizenga College of Business and Entrepreneurship Professor, Department of Population Health Sciences, Nova Southeastern University; Dr. Kiran C. Patel, College of Allopathic Medicine, Nova Southeastern University; Dr. Carlos Mendoza, Neuro-Ophthalmologist, University of Miami Bascom Palmer Eye Institute; Dr. Anuj Jayakar, Medical Director, Neurocritical Care Program, Nicklaus Children's Hospital Brain Institute; and Michael Berger, Teacher of the Visually Impaired, Miami Lighthouse Academy.

Our first CVI report on this \$2 million project took place in August at an on-site luncheon with presentations by Dr. Carlos Mendoza, University of Miami's Bascom Palmer Eye Institute; Dr. Francois Sainfort, Nova Southeastern University; and Dr. Anuj Jayakar, Nicklaus Children's Hospital, along with our Chief Program Officer Carol Brady-Simmons, and our highly credentialed Teacher of the Visually Impaired, Mike Berger. Highlights of the report are listed below:

- A manuscript entitled, "The Miami Lighthouse CVI Collaborative Center: A Comprehensive Multidisciplinary Initiative to Address Cortical Visual Impairment," by Virginia Jacko, et al., was submitted to the *Journal of Visual Impairment and Blindness* and is currently pending review.
- Retrospective review and analysis of the Miami Lighthouse CVI database, in collaboration with Michael Berger, MLB (January 2025 August 2025):
  - o Miami Lighthouse has conducted 133 CVI range assessments on 111 unique children. The data is being continuously updated by Michael Berger at the Miami Lighthouse.
  - o To date, 94 children were fully assessed using the CVI range assessment tool. Of those, 87 unique children were scored at least once. For the remaining 7 children, the data are still being processed to produce the quantitative scores.
  - o To date, there have been 12 patients in the Nicklaus Children's Hospital NICU who have undergone Neonatal Assessment Visual European Grid (NAVEG) screening. The NAVEG screening was found to be positive in 11 of the 12 (92%).
  - o Miami Lighthouse has presented NAVEG presentations/training at Southernmost Coast Early Steps and Holtz Children's Hospital, and plans are underway for training at North Dade Early Steps.
  - o Review of Cortical/Cerebral Visual Impairment: Clinical and Genetic Approaches (November 2024 May 2025) was conducted by Bascom Palmer Eye Institute. This scoping review included 66 articles and was published by *Survey of Ophthalmology*, one of the highest-impact journals in the field (ranked 5th out of 95 in Ophthalmology).
  - o Collaboration between Bascom Palmer and Miami Lighthouse for the Blind strengthens the program by helping us better understand the educational and emotional needs of patients. In addition, these patients have already received or will receive a formal CVI assessment.
  - o The long-term opportunity lies in creating a formalized, research-backed CVI assessment tool. This tool could become a standardized approach for early intervention CVI evaluation and support filling a national and international need.

## Children Need Comprehensive Eye Exams as Part of School Preparation

Without comprehensive eye exams, children are at risk of falling behind academically, experiencing social challenges, and facing eye health risks. For many children, a pair of glasses isn't just about seeing clearly, it's about unlocking their full potential in school and life. Yet far too many children still lack access to essential eye healthcare.

Our Florida Heiken Children's Vision Program, a Miami Lighthouse subsidiary, encounters these challenges every day. Addressing children's eye health is the sole mission of our Heiken Program. Since inception, through a network of licensed optometrists we have provided over 227,000 comprehensive dilated eye exams and have provided glasses when prescribed for underserved children across the state at no cost thanks to funding from the Florida Department of Health, The Children's Trust, and others. These comprehensive exams go beyond basic screenings. They detect serious eye conditions that could lead to permanent blindness if left untreated.

We express appreciation to the 2025 Florida Legislature for their support of our Florida Heiken Children's Vision Program through the Florida Department of Health. This past school year our Heiken Program faced an overwhelming 31,575 requests for service, an all-time high, and provided 16,494 comprehensive eye exams with the funding available to us.


