MIAMI LIGHTHOUSE DISTRIBUTING FRESH PRODUCE BOXES TO CLIENTS AND FAMILIES ON FRIDAY, MAY 29

WHAT: Distribution of free boxes of organic fruits and vegetables

DETAILS: **Miami Lighthouse for the Blind** will distribute 160 20-pound boxes of fresh-picked, Florida grown fruits and vegetables to its visually impaired clients and their families. The produce was provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farmers to Families Food Box Program and the donation was coordinated by **Miami-Dade County Commissioner Eileen Higgins, District 5**.

Client recipients will use Special Transportation Services (STS) and families members will drive their cars into the Miami Lighthouse parking garage to receive their boxes of fresh produce.

“So many of our clients come from lower income families and live in Miami’s inner city,” said Miami Lighthouse President and CEO Virginia Jacko. “These wonderful boxes of magnificent produce will make a real difference in their lives. We are extremely grateful to Commissioner Higgins and U.S. Department of Agriculture for their generosity and concern for others.”

Miami Lighthouse for the Blind offers programs that serve visually impaired residents of all ages from infants in its Blind Babies program and students in its Miami Lighthouse Learning Center for Children™ to elderly clients in its Senior Group Activities program. Its Florida Heiken Children’s Vision Program provides free eye examinations and glasses to disadvantaged children in public schools throughout Florida.
