Profile Of The Month Meet Krizia Perez, Social Worker for the Children's Program



as she presides over the fast expanding Blind Babies "Play Day" program. The two-hour long morning sessions involve mothers and their babies in a series of activities designed to help the youngsters learn to interact with others and help the parents to work with their visually impaired offspring. Krizia describes the program as offering sensory play, gross motor activity and literacy in the form of reading by both the parents and staff, and notes that many of the children make remarkable progress. "I love my job," says Krizia, a Miami native, who has been with Miami Lighthouse for four years and holds a Masters Degree in Social Work from Barry University. "When I am not here at Miami Lighthouse, I am most often visiting in the homes of families whose

children are visually impaired." On Monday and Wednesday mornings these families have the opportunity to participate in programs specifically designed for blind babies. "When a mother exclaims, 'Oh, I didn't know my blind child could play with others,' we know our
